NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT

- 1. The County of Clay hereby approves the document titled "South Eastern Council of Governments Joint Cooperative Agreement" among Clay, Lincoln, McCook, Minnehaha, Turner, and Union counties and the cities of Brandon, Harrisburg, Sioux Falls and Vermillion.
- 2. The agreement, containing revisions to the existing 2010 Joint Cooperative Agreement, is attached to and hereby made a part of this resolution.

The Board of County Commissioners met in special session on Tuesday, March 7, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. for an informational meeting with landowners near 321 St. & Missouri St. regarding rezoning from Agriculture or Natural Resource Conservation to Rural Residential. Officials in attendance were Travis Mockler, Phyllis Packard, Leo Powell, Director of Equalization Gene Lunn, Zoning Administrator Cynthia Aden, and Carri Crum.

Mockler called the meeting to order and then turned discussion over to Aden, who explained that the County is proposing a zoning change because the area is being used as residential and that rezoning it to Rural Residential has certain protections.

Denny Kayl asked if the re-zoning would change the permissible size of buildings. Aden explained that accessory buildings are still allowed in Rural Residential, but the usage of those buildings is restricted. For example, a person cannot build a structure to house animals for sale, but a person can store his/her boats, etc. Lunn said the covenants restrict size, not zoning, and Aden explained that the covenants will not go away.

Charles Chervek asked what is required for buildable lot size under Rural Residential. Aden and Powell said the lots would need to be 1 acre.

Matthew Heard had several concerns. First, he and Aden discussed the Right-to-Farm clause within the ordinance, and Aden said that anyone currently using the land for agricultural purposes would be allow to be non-conforming after the re-zoning.

Heard asked about restoration after damage and used the example of what happens when a person's shed burns down and the setbacks have changed. Aden and Mockler explained that a variance can be granted, and the County tries to work with people in such situations.

He then asked what will happen to the boat ramp lot in the future, to which Aden said it would remain, but a building over 144 sq. ft. could not be constructed on the lot.

Heard also asked for clarification on allowed animals, and Aden said it would not be permissible to have animals being grown for the purpose of selling them.

He stated for informational purposes that currently the side yard is required to be 30 ft., but Rural Residential only requires a minimum of 10 ft. from the lot line.

Lisa Johnson voiced concern about her family's land that is currently farmed, and Aden said it would fall under non-conforming use and would be allowed to be used as it is currently.

Pat Butler wondered what would happen if a lot were not wide enough to build on, and Aden clarified that a person could apply for a variance.

Aden explained that the re-zoning is a lengthy process. It goes through the Planning & Zoning Commission first, which requires public hearing. Then it moves to the County Commission, which requires a public hearing and a second reading, after which there is a 20-day waiting period for the ordinance to become effective.

Butler asked what happens if a structure is not 125 ft. from the river. Aden said the ordinance requires 125 ft., regardless of the zoning category, but existing structures would not have to be moved.

Kelly McKelvey asked if a camper would be considered a residence, and Aden said it would not because it is moveable.

Kayl asked why the County is proposing the zoning change. Aden and Powell explained that the area has been platted as residential and should have been zoned as Rural Residential at the time of the platting, and the County is trying to change it to what it should be in accordance with the zoning ordinance.

The issue of the cul-de-sac in Gunderson's addition was briefly discussed.

Butler said he is in favor of the re-zoning.

Lunn said the lots are assessed as small acreage, and that will not change. The only change is the market, which fluctuates.

Heard said his only dissent is the 10 ft. side yards but asked for clarification regarding how lots are determined to be Prime River, River, or Rural First Acreage. Lunn discussed the matter and said he would need to research the lots that Heard questioned.

Johnson asked if there is much difference in tax between Prime River, River, or Rural First Acreage. Lunn said the mill levy is the same, but assessed value varies.

Discussion took place between Chervek and Butler regarding the river bank along their properties, and the Mockler reviewed the lot line map with them to clarify the area that Gunderson owns along the river.

Johnson asked if there is a difference in the way land is assessed on Missouri River frontage vs. Vermillion River frontage. Lunn said he would need to look at the specific requirements between Prime River and River before providing a definitive answer.

The meeting adjourned at 7:37 p.m.

The Board of County Commissioners met in special session on Thursday, May 25, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. for a public hearing of the first reading regarding amendment of the 2013 Revised Zoning Ordinance for Clay County. Specifically, the Board of County Commissioners considered adoption of amendments to Section 2.02, Definitions, Section 3.07, Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO), Section 4.05.01, NRC: Natural Resource Conservation District and Section 4.05.02, A-1: Agricultural District, which were recommended by the Clay County Planning Commission. Members present: Travis Mockler, Phyllis Packard, Micheal Manning, and Richard Hammond. Also present: Toby Brown, Southeast Council of Governments, Cynthia Aden, Zoning Administrator, Alexis Tracy, State's Attorney, and Carri Crum, Auditor.

Travis Mockler, Chairman, called the meeting to order and turned the meeting over to Cynthia Aden, Zoning Administrator. The Board and the audience discussed prior suggestions that the Board members were accepting bribes. Sharon Gray wished to go on public record that she does not accuse any Commissioners of taking bribes.

Aden moved on to point out that the sections under review are not exclusive, that the zoning ordinance sections work together. She presented a zoning map and discussed wellhead protection areas, aquifer protection areas, etc.

Aden explained definitions in the proposed ordinance. Nicholas Britten asked questions regarding the definition of CAFOs in relation to agriculture.

Aden also explained conditional use permits. Barbara Yelverton asked who monitors animal numbers, whether a neighbor has to complain that someone is exceeding numbers. It was explained that Aden is a part-time zoning officer, so she would respond on a complaint basis.

Charles Yelverton asked about the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) process for a CAFO. Travis Mockler explained that the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) office would be involved. Aden explained the animal number charts. Charles Yelverton and Britten both asked questions about whether a person could have two different kinds of animals on the same properties. Packard, Hammond, Travis Mockler, and Aden explained that there would need to be clearance from the State under state laws. Aden discussed dairy numbers in relation to resource usage and the numbers statistically required for a dairy to be successful and clarified that there are additional requirements to be met for a dairy operation as opposed to other animals.

Aden reviewed the various setbacks under the proposed ordinance and explained that the manure application setbacks are advisory, as the State regulates manure application. Barbara Yelverton asked who would approve an impermeable liner. Travis Mockler explained that the liner would be engineered, the DENR would approve it, and then the Planning & Zoning Commission would also give approval. Charles Yelverton asked if the County could work with a manager and not know the owner of a CAFO because the proposed ordinance is not clear. Travis Mockler said the State will not allow a plan with a manager signature, but the verbiage could be added to the proposed ordinance.

Aden discussed proof of insurance requirements. Charles Yelverton asked if an insurance person working for an operator would be a reliable person and suggested a scientist or engineer would be better. Aden asked how a scientist would know how much to insure an operation for. Mark Winegar asked if the Department of Agriculture could provide a number, to which the Board said it would not. Travis Mockler said there is a fund set up for situations where an owner left a bad situation.

The next change Aden reviewed was building site vs. lot area. She explained that it has nothing to do with CAFO, but it needed to be fixed in the regulations. Then she again discussed conditional use permit requirements. She also discussed that Animal Feeding Operations (AFO) were added to prohibited uses in the Aquifer Protection Overlay (APO). Aden pointed out the requirements for impermeability standards that would have to be met via engineering studies. She said the process is more prohibitive than in the current regulations.

Transmission of liquid hydrocarbon requirements for meeting federal, state, and industry standards are also being clarified in the proposed regulations.

Travis Mockler turned the meeting over to public comment. Gray said she appreciates the work put into the proposed ordinance, and she feels some things are actually positive. She said everyone has biases, and she is against CAFOs. If someone is trying to build a large dairy in Clay County, she would like the Board to share it. She feels like bumping the dairy number to 5,600 is ridiculous. She said the setbacks to waters of the state should not be messed with.

John Davidson said it's wonderful that on Memorial Day week the people can get together to express their freedom of speech. He asked permission to share documents as a part of the file for the permanent record. He quoted Real Estate appraisal statistics regarding decrease in value of private residences in proximity to CAFOs, and said the government is effectively taking property values for that purpose. He said he sees CAFOs as a direct attempt to take away investment from property owners, and said the County has the responsibility to protect the existing investment.

Britten said conditional use for aquifers seems to permit CAFOs over aquifer protection. He also says the County should find a better way to ensure properties are properly insured.

Charles Yelverton said he is disappointed because the Commissioners are responsible for the public health, and there is nothing in the ordinance about public health. He feels the laxities in the proposed ordinance is harmful to public health. He would propose a reduction of dairy cattle to 3,000 to promote organic pasture organizations.

Paul Hasse asked how many of the 4 Commissioners have read the proposed ordinance in its entirety and who presented the need for changes. The Board members said they have each read it multiple times. How much natural gas do the feedlots use? Aden said she has no way of knowing. Hasse said the supply of natural gas in the county is limited. He asked how this would affect llamas, alpacas, and pheasants. Mockler said other animal types not listed in the table are considered on a case by case basis.

Sandy Pederson said there is a small feed lot below the bluff. She asked how many animals are in that lot. Aden explained that the joint jurisdiction area with the City of Vermillion will not be

changed. She asked how many are on the lot on the way to Sioux Falls, and Travis Mockler said 3,000.

Barbara Yelverton conceded that the people in the room are probably all biased against CAFOs. Lynn Riley said she is against confined operations and claimed that the animals have to be drugged a lot to keep them healthy, to which Travis Mockler said that is a fallacy. She said she feels like the County is relying on current technology, such as impermeable liners, too much. She said she thinks the County has blind faith.

Clarence Pederson asked for clarification about the operation below the bluff. Aden said it is not in this particular jurisdiction, so she would have to look at the joint jurisdiction regulations. Travis Mockler said if it was out in the county it would be a small CAFO and said the ordinance has nothing to do with how the animals are raised, but instead regulates pollution. He said he is concerned that the County only has a part-time zoning person and suggested adding staff. Travis Mockler said it would likely require raising taxes for the County to be able to afford it. Riley said the fee should be high for CAFOs. Britten said he is willing to pay more taxes to have staff who could handle monitoring these issues, and Winegar said he would agree.

Hasse reminded the Board not to forget about roads and bridges. The Board pointed out that large CAFOs often have agreements to pay for the roads.

Davidson said it would be good to work together to find investments in the community that are compatible with existing investments and asked what the Commissioners have done to explore this. Travis Mockler asked why raising livestock wouldn't compliment what Clay County already has. Davidson said CAFOs are essentially factories and at a certain point it ceases to be farming.

Keith Mockler said he is in favor of the proposed ordinance because the current ordinance makes it very difficult for anyone to get a building permit. He said he and his brother would like to add 200 head of cattle to his existing 200 head, and they cannot do it. He asked Davidson not to lump everyone into a large operation. He said the current ordinance does not work at all, and he would like to see some action by the Board on the proposed ordinance.

Cindy Struckman-Johnson said she has farmland in Gregory County. She said there is a CAFO that has forced its way in via a waiver of the County Commissioners. She said she agrees with all concerns expressed. She shared something she wrote to Gregory County regarding toxic manure lagoons in relation to public health. She thinks the dairy number is excessive.

Travis Mockler asked for comments from the Commissioners. Hammond pointed out a section on conditional uses in aquifer protection zones and corrected an "and" vs. "or" typo and a "may" vs. "shall" typo to avoid being permissive in the ordinance.

Keith Mockler asked how many sites are available for a large dairy in Clay County, more than four or five? Hammond said in his opinion there may be one area. Travis Mockler said the State has identified three areas, and said those landowners do not even know they have the suitable land.

Hammond pointed out a few more areas that he thought could be clarified, and the Board discussed them.

Packard said they have worked very hard to come up with a compromise. She said she feels it still gives a great deal of protection or ways to question operators. She said regarding the insurance requirement and said the Board has explored and has not found a better solution.

Manning said the Board really has listened to the public's opinions and suggestions. He said there are some things that no one will ever agree on, the Board cannot predict the future and can only work with what they have today. He said he is not concerned about the 5,600 number as long as the County can regulate it.

Keith Mockler asked if a person wanted to build a 5,500-head dairy operation, would they have to apply for a conditional use permit which would require a public hearing? The Board answered that it would have to go to public hearing.

Britten asked why have the 5,600 number if it is not possible in Clay County. Aden said former commissioner Raymond Passick suggested it to give the County an opportunity for economic growth if an operator could prove itself. Manning said the idea was that as long as the County could regulate it, then the number would be insignificant. He pointed out the regulations in place at the State level. Britten asked the Board why they would ever want a 5,600-head operation. Packard said there are two schools of thought. The larger number is the viable economic size, and the other side is 3,500 sustainability. Barbara Yelverton discussed organic dairies as well. Keith Mockler said if he wanted a 50-cow organic dairy, he cannot do it under the current ordinance. Aden said the difficulties of the current ordinance include insurance requirements and the high cost of the permits required for a CAFO, the ordinance restricts smaller operations such as small organic operations. She said she has attempted to use the current ordinance with a couple of smaller hog operations, and it was impossible.

After discussion regarding having another first reading due to changes the Board made during the hearing, Hammond moved, seconded by Manning and carried to set the first reading and public hearing for June 27, 2017 and the second reading for July 6, 2017.

At 9:06 p.m., Manning moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to adjourn.

Commissioners considered adoption of amendments to Section 2.02, Definitions; Section 3.07, Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO); Section 4.05.01, NRC: Natural Resource Conservation District; Section 4.05.02, A-1: Agricultural District; and 4.0508, APO: Aquifer Protection Overlay District, which were recommended by the Clay County Planning Commission.

Chad Peterson was present and discussed the regulations as they apply, and would potentially apply, to his family. He talked about the stress on family farms and told those present that he wanted to join the family farming, but it was not possible for his family's farm to expand due to current conditions in Clay County. He said livestock are value-added agriculture and make it possible for many local farmers to survive. Peterson said he knows others his age who would have joined their family's farming businesses but could not, and explained that it hurts them to know that they have to choose another career. Powell asked if the County's regulations would make it easier, or more difficult, for him and people his age to get into farming. Peterson said he cannot speak for everyone, but the proposed regulations would help his family farm move forward. He said also that with the right operating practices, it is actually better for the environment. Peterson discussed the additional jobs that expansion could bring and also the college education required for a farmer to run larger operations. Barbara Yelverton asked if his family would use outside investors for expansion, and Peterson said yes. Peterson said he has been fed for 20 years by "share croppers," so to speak, and the investors his father would use are from South Dakota. Sharon Gray asked if it was the process, the number of cattle, or the setbacks that make it difficult for his family to expand. Peterson said the process and the requirement to spend a lot of capital in order to even bring forth a proposal to the County. He said he agrees that there should be setbacks. Peterson also said Iowa has 3 times the population and 20 times the animals as South Dakota, and Sioux County is still a great place. Mark Winegar asked if Peterson could point to any specific parts of the proposed ordinance that would help. Peterson spoke about the economic impact to farmers and how it would allow his family's farm to operate. The increased number of livestock units would help his family. Jerry Wilson asked what part of the present ordinance's process hinders his family. Peterson discussed problems his cousin had with a previous proposal and the costs involved.

Charles Yelverton said the numbers had not changed except dairy, and he does not think 5,600 will make that much difference. Barbara Yelverton said the process does not change. Cynthia Aden, Zoning Administrator, replied that the process does change significantly; currently the water quality permit costs \$10,000-12,000 up front, and the changes will allow a discussion to take place first to discover whether the site is good before the operator needs the water quality permit. The SD Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) wants the County to have done some review first before the operator applies for the water quality permit. Powell said the change in the process makes sense to him because the information about the site is being gathered first. Jerry Wilson said he does not see any place in the current ordinance that says Aden cannot talk to people. He said he grew up on a small family farm where there was no place for him. He cited statistics that claim large dairies put family farmers out of business. J. Wilson is concerned that a medium operation would be allowed over aquifer zone B. He is also concerned that an operation could expand without increased setbacks to neighboring property and worries that the County will be sued and taxpayers will pay. Powell reviewed section 3.07 with J. Wilson. J. Wilson said the DENR will not regulate Animal Feeding Operations (AFOs), only Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs). Hammond and Mockler said the DENR will assist the County if the County requests it. Hammond said on page 12 of the new general permit just passed by the State in April the SDCL 34A-3A-24 addresses shallow aquifer. Hammond and Wilson discussed the aquifer zones in relation to AFOs and CAFOs. Aden clarified that medium AFOs were added to

conditional use permit requirements so that the County would have more regulatory ability. Hammond and State's Attorney Alexis Tracy discussed SDCL 34A-3A-24. J. Wilson asked where it says the County will request the DENR's assistance in regulation of medium AFOs in the shallow aquifer. Aden pointed out section 3.07 6F. Cindy Struckman-Johnson asked if it could be added that a request will be made by the County to the DENR, so as not to assume that the County will. Hammond referred back to the State's general permit as it regulates operations, and the aforementioned statute.

Sharon Gray said the process is getting cleaned up and clear, but her concern is with animal numbers and she thinks if numbers were kept as-is the County would have a proposal that a lot of people could get behind. Her next concern was setbacks. She asked if limiting existing operations from expansion is what the Commissioners are concerned about. Manning pointed out some existing Clay County family operations that want to expand but are limited. Hammond and J. Wilson discussed buffer strips. Norma Wilson said the reduction of setbacks is an arbitrary thing. The protection of citizens and water must be considered. Aden said it is a delicate issue, that setbacks could also be a "taking" to an existing operation. Peterson discussed environmental regulations and cover crops as they pertain to animal feeding operations and pointed out that certain practices of an animal feeding operation are not regulations but are a matter of practice for better, more successful farming.

Richard Menzel spoke on health hazards of large farming operations, treatment of animals, and the Old Testament.

Gray discussed Small A and Small B with Aden in regard to pollution hazards. Gray also clarified that dairy numbers are the only numbers being increased and asked that the number be kept at 3,500. Powell and Mockler spoke with Gray about the statistical break-even number of 4,500 for dairy as it relates to the economy. Gray said if they cannot break even at 3,500 then that is maybe not the type of farming Clay County needs.

N. Wilson talked about her observation at a dairy facility. Struckman-Johnson asked for a compromise of 4,500. The Board discussed milk prices and supply with B. Yelverton. J. Wilson asked why Clay County would want to shift focus away from family operations. Mockler explained it opens many opportunities for other jobs such as trucking, veterinary services, and higher sale prices of crops used for feeding the animals, etc. The audience discussed that these types of jobs attract foreign labor, not local people, to which Powell replied that, regardless of where they are from, farm workers are buying homes, groceries, attending churches, and spending money in the communities in which they work, not just sending money back to family in their native countries. He also discussed "takings" in relation to reduced property values and said reducing the animal numbers could also be considered a "taking" from the existing farmers who cannot expand because it is taking away from their opportunities to make a living. B. Yelverton and J. Wilson discussed Sioux County, Iowa. C. Yelverton discussed public health concerns and that the ordinance does not set rules about how a farmer takes care of its animals regarding antibiotics. Mockler discussed federal Food & Drug Administration regulations regarding antibiotic usage in livestock. Struckman-Johnson said she feels the Board favors economic development over environmental protection. Menzel quoted statistics regarding respiratory diseases.

Packard asked if a compromise of 4,500 is possible in the opinion of the audience. Hammond said previous discussion regarding reduction of the dairy number and talked about his own experience being on dairy farms in the past few years. Gray discussed the referral process for ordinances to be brought to

an election. Powell said he has been asked by a local farmer why he needs to go across the river to Nebraska to farm instead of being able to make it in Clay County. N. Wilson asked if buffer strips could be added as a requirement of setbacks. Manning said he would rather have animals inside than to have the smell like the operation along the interstate which has been discussed in previous meetings. J. Wilson discussed water pollution and cleanup operations and suggested that the Board is blind to the topic of water pollution getting worse. Manning and Hammond cited studies that found buffer strips did not hinder pollution. Struckman-Johnson asked that a qualifying statement be added to the ordinance regarding reducing the chance of pollution by using buffer strips. Winegar said he worries that there is an assumption with very little research and said that pollution coming downstream is not necessarily coming from farmland.

Powell moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to proceed with the previously scheduled second reading of the proposed Ordinance #2017-01 on July 6, 2017 at 10:00 a.m.

Alexis Tracy discussed answers received from Executive Technologies to the Board's questions on the phone system quote. Powell moved, seconded by Packard and carried to authorize the Chairman to sign the contract for the phone system.

Tracy reported the payroll addition of Jill Dotson as Legal Assistant/Victim's Witness Assistant beginning July 10, 2017 at the annual salary of \$34,274.80.

Manning moved, seconded by Powell and carried to authorize the Chairman to sign an Acceptance of Service for a foreclosure matter in which the County is owed Real Estate taxes.

At 12:24 p.m. Manning moved, seconded by Packard and carried to adjourn and reconvene Thursday, July 6, 2017 at 9:00 a.m.

Layne Stewart, Emergency Management Director, met with the Board for the 2018 LEPC and Emergency Management budget requests and the SLA Quarterly Activity Report. Manning moved, seconded by Powell and carried to authorize the Chairman's signature on the SLA Quarterly Activity Report FY2017.

Andy Howe, Sheriff/Coroner, met with the Board for the 2018 requests for the Sheriff's Office, Jail, 24/7 Sobriety Project, and Coroner budgets.

Cynthia Aden, Veterans/Welfare/Zoning Administrator, met with the Board for the 2018 budget requests.

Terry Taggart, Mike Lynch, and Misi Kayl of the Clay County Soil Conservation District met with the Board for the 2018 budget request.

A second reading was held for Ordinance #2017-01, an amendment to the 2013 Revised Zoning Ordinance for Clay County. Specifically, the Board of County Commissioners considered adoption of amendments to Section 2.02, Definitions; Section 3.07, Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO); Section 4.05.01, NRC: Natural Resource Conservation District; Section 4.05.02, A-1: Agricultural District; and 4.0508, APO: Aquifer Protection Overlay District, which were recommended by the Clay County Planning Commission. Mockler began by reading a chain of e-mails from Jerry Wilson that the State's Attorney wished to have entered on record.

Powell pointed out there are no large dairies in the county.

Packard said the raise in dairy numbers has been a big issue. She has researched prize-winning farms and found numbers of 2,150, 3,400, and 3,000; only one was 7,000. Packard said she began to further question whether Clay County's small size allows enough space to provide manure management for

larger operations. She is also concerned about potential lawsuits in the future. Mockler said that Clay County has 220,000 available acres that are not currently under a manure management plan.

Hammond said he feels like 4,000 might be a more appropriate number, but he can live with smaller setbacks because he does not feel like that will impact the environment and water.

Manning said the county has not attracted anyone at 3,500 head, and if the numbers are raised it might be an opportunity to attract someone. Hammond said he does not think the number of head is keeping businesses away from Clay County, that there are a number of other reasons.

Powell moved to approve the second reading of the Ordinance #2017-01 as presented; seconded by Manning. The Chairman opened the motion for discussion. Barbara Yelverton said the two things bothering those opposed are increases in dairy numbers and reduction of setbacks. She read and presented a petition to the Board requesting Mockler to recuse himself as he is a farmer.

Stew Hines said he spent the morning discussing matters with Kent Woodsman from the State who said he has 8 staff. He said Woodsman told him if the complaint comes from the Commission they are not required to follow up, so a citizen would have to fill out a form to file a complaint.

Daniel Grant, a citizen of Yankton County, said there are 7 CAFO applications currently being opposed. He said people are fighting for the environment to protect the earth and asked the Board to take heed of the concerns.

Patricia Gramkow from Yankton County asked if the board is going to tax the citizens more to pay for roads. Mockler discussed cost share for paying for roads. Gramkow also discussed bacteria that are transmissible to humans and mad cow disease in Canada.

Elizabeth Simmons stated she is a former rancher and said she does not want antibiotics and hormones in her milk.

Charles Yelverton said the board is responsible for public health and it has been recommended there be no new confinement operations. He said the Board is doing a disservice in that regard, that it would be best to work on numbers and setbacks.

Suzanne Skyrm said coral reefs off Florida and the Gulf Coast are dying due to what is coming out of the rivers such as chemicals and fertilizers, and without coral reefs the ocean cannot sustain fish.

Frank Kloucek of Scotland said he helped introduce bill years ago to ban hormones from milk. He stated he does not want to say, "I told you so" twenty years from now and thinks setbacks are too close. He presented articles regarding disease, MRSA, and staph in general.

Clarence Pederson discussed what the processes are for applying manure: knifing, spreading, and using irrigation. He said he drove through Minnesota, and the stench was unbelievable from a farmer applying manure. He also said he would like to see the setbacks be bigger.

Brenda Fergen asked how many in the room have lived on a farm. She said she grew up on a farm and said it took a lot of care to know when to spread manure in order to live on the farm. She cited avian and swine flu in relation to antibiotic usage.

Jerry Wilson said he provided an overview of the evolution of ordinances in Clay County to the Rotary Club last fall. He quoted Powell as saying at that meeting, "I don't disagree with anything that Jerry said." He asked what changed since the last meeting. Powell said he would like to see the numbers at 3,600, but he also believes people trying to make a living in Clay County need the opportunity to do that. Powell said Tim Heine asked him why he cannot raise more hogs in Clay County and asked why he needs to go to Nebraska, to which the audience collectively said to let Nebraska have the hogs.

Alexis Tracy, State's Attorney, addressed the petition for conflict of interest. She said her opinion is that she is not aware of any financial gain Chairman Mockler would have from the change to this ordinance, unless someone can present some new facts. She said the Commissioners all come from different walks of life and bring different interests to the table. Tracy clarified that it would, however, be appropriate for any commissioner to recuse themselves from approval of a specific application for a CAFO at the time it was presented if there were any conflict of interest.

Sharon Gray said she is concerned about manure and wants larger setbacks than in the current ordinance. She said she came back from vacation in Okoboji, IA and experienced smelly CAFOs during her travels.

Charles Yelverton said he sees MRSA cases on a daily basis, and it currently takes 2 antibiotics and often specialty care in Sioux Falls to treat it.

Bruce Gray said even if the State is sharing half the cost of roads with CAFO operations, then it is still a burden on taxpayers.

Powell said he has spent over 20 years in government and has researched the proposed ordinance in detail.

Cindy Gehm asked who is benefitting from this ordinance proposal. Mockler said the farm community would benefit. Elizabeth Simmons said she buys from the local farmer and does not want antibiotics in her meat. Powell said there have been farmers at the first few meetings who said what they wanted to say, and others were too quiet.

Rebecca Turk said she is an organizer for Dakota Rural Action. She said her organization helps people fight expansion of farms because fewer people benefit economically from CAFOs, that smaller family farms help grow the economy.

Liz Hanson clarified the text of the notice of second reading. Elizabeth Simmons said a 10:00 a.m. meeting is not convenient for the public. Mockler pointed out that all of the public hearings have been in the evening except two.

Manning asked Charles Yelverton about antibiotic usage in relation to livestock. Yelverton discussed antibiotic resistance and usage and said he now has to give two antibiotics to patients with cellulitis or

boils. Manning asked if he is seeing a large number of those in Clay County even though the county does not have dairies. Yelverton said the Commissioners should not tempt health issues by attracting large operations. Tom Cooper also discussed his concerns.

Greg Redlin said he knows very little about CAFOs and technical issues, but he said he is disappointed in the response from the Commissioners to the audience's questions. He said his sister is married to a dairy farmer, and they recently doubled the size of their herd from 100 to 200. Doubling the size seemed enormous to him due to the equipment and buildings needed. He said cannot fathom a farm of 5,600 dairy head. He suggested the Commission wait until they actually have an application for an operation of 5,600 head. Mockler said that scenario happened in Turner County, and the county was sued due to being favorable to one operator. Brenda Fergen asked why Turner County changed the law for one operator and said if they did they should be sued. Manning said the Board is trying to be proactive, not reactive. Barbara Yelverton suggested an operator of 3,500 head should prove itself before being given the opportunity to expand. Mockler said he proposed that 2 years ago and was rejected by the opposition.

Powell made a motion to call to question; seconded by Manning. All voted aye. Regarding the motion called to question the roll call vote was as follows: Packard-no, Hammond-no, Manning-yes, Powell-no, Mockler-yes.

Mockler said the County may enforce the ordinance in place as written, and all people with animals, even those with just one horse, will receive a letter that they will need to comply with CAFO regulations. Barbara Yelverton asked why the numbers cannot just be changed. Mockler and Powell said the same issues have been tossed around for over 3 years with no resolution.

At 11:30 a.m. Powell moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to adjourn and reconvene Tuesday, July 11, 2017 at 9:00 a.m.

Wilson said to keep in mind that the article discussed the largest dairy currently in Yankton County, which is under 300 cows. Charles Yelverton said hydrogen-sulfide is the smell in manure, and the level that becomes detectable by smell is near the level that is toxic for small children, so smell is not always a good indicator of levels. Heisinger discussed antibiotics, bacteria, and antibiotic-resistant bacteria. Hammond said probably 20% of water wells he works with have a hydrogen sulfide smell, and if the smell is an indicator of health risk, he is in big trouble, as is a good share of the public because most of the water in South Dakota is calcium sulfide. Yelverton said it is important not to continue to increase concentration in day to day life.

Alexis Tracy, State's Attorney, pointed out in the Minnehaha Co. Joint Powers Juvenile Detention Center Agreement renewal the section regarding secure vs. non-secure shelter care and explained the changes that have recently taken place between Volunteers of America and Lutheran Social Services. Powell moved, seconded by Packard and carried to authorize the Chairman to sign the agreement.

At 10:00 a.m., a Public Hearing and First Reading was held for Ordinance #2017-01, an amendment to the 2013 Revised Zoning Ordinance for Clay County. Specifically, the Board of County Commissioners will be considering adoption of amendments to Section 2.02, Definitions; Section 3.07, Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO); Section 4.05.01, NRC: Natural Resource Conservation District;

Section 4.05.02, A-1: Agricultural District; and 4.0508, APO: Aquifer Protection Overlay District, which were recommended by the Clay County Planning Commission.

Meghann Jarchow said she is against the ordinance and thinks the County should keep what it has.

Jim Petrik said the Commissioners have been working on this for a long, long, long time; something has to be done. He pointed out that the current ordinance looks very similar to the past ordinance, but Clay County was never overrun in the past with CAFO applications.

Cindy Kirkeby said she is disappointed in having to be at the hearing; the Commissioners are supposed to protect land and water, and it seems like the ordinance is being written for special interests.

Don Lyso said he thinks it's disrespectful to farmers that the audience is always against any changes; somewhere along the line both sides have to compromise. He stated the Commissioners are trying to make it so his children and grandchildren can keep farming. He said he thinks the Commissioners are trying to compromise, but the group is not letting it happen.

Kirkeby said she wants the small farmers in Clay County. D. Lyso asked what she considers a small farmer. Kirkeby referred to the ordinance's animal number table, and Justin Orr said those numbers are equivalent to a non-existing farmer.

D. Lyso said there are a lot less farmers than there were in the past; he and his family alone have taken over about nine. He said allowing more livestock is one way of keeping people here without them having to buy more land. He also stated setbacks are getting encroached with new homes being built. He asked the crowd how much money it takes to retire, or to keep your family going? He stated everybody is different. He told the crowd to look at the Heines; their operation has expanded out but there is a need to be able to do it without buying more land. He stated if all of the family wants to farm, there isn't enough jobs. Kirkeby asked what about the old ordinance prevented him from doing what he wants to do. D. Lyso said the old ordinance automatically puts people out of compliance.

Orr said it is trying to put red tape on someone who is trying to the best they can with the land. He said they are not out to pollute the water. Tyler Johnson said farmers are more regulated on fertilizers than people in town; farmers have to know how many pounds of fertilizer is applied per acre. He said farmers are not trying to hurt anyone, and if they do not take care of the land then they are the ones hurting. Johnson said they are trying to produce the best crop to feed America.

Kirkeby said permits have been in the regulations for years for a certain number of animals, but the problem is that it does not allow for very small animal numbers.

Jim Petrik said the SD Dept. of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) has engineers. He said he would like everyone to think about something: the current regulations are terrific for companies like Stewart Oil. Everything leaves Clay County, and it means burnt oil and truck tires for the environment in order to transport everything. He said there are ten times more people and livestock in Lincoln and Minnehaha, and everyone can get along. Petrik said the group is disrespectful to Commissioners that have worked so hard on the proposed ordinance. It has never been his worry that the big investors will overrun Clay County with livestock operations.

Jerry Wilson said he and Petrik were involved in writing the present ordinance and that Johnson and Petrick are both good young farmers and his neighbors. He said the ordinance should be designed for them to continue without interference. Wilson said the current ordinance allows family farms to fly below the radar; the proposed changes are about reducing setbacks from waterways, lakes, and streams, and also about increasing numbers of dairy to point it would be beyond the reach of anyone in Clay County. Wilson said he thinks what many are concerned about is that instead of cleaning up the process as to who is regulated and in what way, for two years some have pushed for corporate mentality so money from China and California can flood into Clay County. Petrik asked, if someone from California wanted to spend \$50 million to add value and taxes to Clay County, would Wilson fight it. Wilson said Hyperion is an example. Petrik said everyone has potential to pollute, there is nothing without risk in life, and if someone was willing to put that amount of money into Clay County it's a risk he would be willing to live with.

Suzanne Skyrm said everyone has to drink water. Petrik said there is a risk with applying manure, but farmers monitor rainfall to minimize risk. He said he is not concerned about manure storage because the biggest risk is the application process, and there is already a state permit in place. Clarence Pederson asked why the manure application setback changed from 300 feet to 200 feet from lakes, rivers, and streams and asked why that would be necessary to change. Aden said it was always 300 feet, never 500, and that it's in line with the State because the County does not administer manure application. The table is simply an advisory table. Aden said the County is following the State.

Kirkeby pointed out the amount of red in the document with marked changes. Aden reminded people that the changes were necessary to make sure that everything was in alignment throughout the entire zoning ordinance. She said the County cannot change just one section; all sections need to be reviewed and/or modified to keep them consistent throughout. Aden said her current problem is that Section 3.07 does not match the rest of the regulations, and the majority of changes have to do with the process.

Wilson asked why the county needs to cut in half the manure setbacks from 500 feet down to 200-300 feet. Aden said there is a different interpretation between individuals as to what is appropriate and important. Wilson said he believes farmers are not interested in polluting water, so why reduce setbacks. Mockler said waters of the state encompasses ditches and tile lines in the current ordinance, so that may put people out of compliance if setbacks are not lowered. Petrik said larger setbacks mean only the wealthiest can afford to farm. Tim Heine said Vermillion's earthen lagoons are within 60 feet from the river, and there are six lagoons. Janice Lyso said she previously worked for Clay Rural Water and stated it is very difficult to meet water regulations, and much testing is required. Packard pointed out that the Planning & Zoning Commission may adjust setbacks on a site-by-site basis, so if there is a site that needs increased setbacks it can be done in public hearings. Wilson stated the current ordinance says the applicant may ask for an exception, and the Planning & Zoning Commission can allow it. Mockler said it does require a waiver from neighbors. Aden clarified that the waters of the state setback is 300 feet for large and medium operations and 200 feet for small. Aden said the state does not have setbacks for waters of the state, just for manure. Hammond said the regulating is done on a complaint basis at the state level, it is easy to file a complaint, and it is confidential during the process. Mockler said people can complain directly to the Commission, and they have to turn it in to DENR. Petrik said if the DENR investigates a complaint the operator has to spend at least \$15,000, regardless of the size of the operation, to obtain permits, testing, etc. Hammond discussed complaints he has been involved with in the past.

Struckman-Johnson said she has heard in Gregory County there is a CAFO breaking all the regulations and no one can get it into compliance. She stated the Commissioners were elected for all people in Clay County, not just farmers. She also said Clay County has a resource that few people in the state have, and a higher standard with the rivers here; water is a priority. Aden said the regulations still have the Aquifer Protection Overlay (APO) District and the Natural Resource Conservation (NRC) District, and those have strong prohibitions in the river areas for livestock in order to protect the water. Section 3.07 is in addition to the other protections. Aden said everyone is focused on the few regulations being changed and not looking at the larger scope of protections the County has already put in place for citizens and water.

Wilson and Mockler debated the number of people involved in drafting the current ordinance. Wilson said the intent of Small B was to exempt small family farms. Aden said that change made using the regulations worse because AFOs were left out. Most of the changes in the proposed regulations involve adding AFOs back in, and that needs to be fixed. Aden said the biggest problems folks have are the setbacks and the dairy numbers. She reiterated that waters of the state are not the rivers, Clay Creek, etc.; they are the smaller systems in the county. The rivers, Clay Creek, etc. are protected by the APO and NRC districts. Aden said protections have been increased in conditional use requirements, so focusing on the tables will not present the entire set of protections the county has in place. Struckman-Johnson said she wants evidence.

Kirkeby asked why the public hearing was held at 10:00 a.m. Mockler said there have been approximately 35 meetings on the topic, and this was only the third meeting that has been in the morning. Farmers in the group asked, if the crowd wants evening meetings to accommodate them, then why should the Commissioners have them in the fall or the spring when farmers are planting as they should accommodate the farmers as well. Powell said at one time the Commissioners had meetings in the evening, and no one showed up. Wilson said a regular meeting and a hearing are two different things.

Kirkeby said there is a big expansion from small to medium in the proposed regulations, and requesting the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) Office is a change. Jim Heisinger said for two years the board has struggled to determine the difference between AFO and CAFO, and NRCS does not determine AFO and CAFO. Mockler said the DENR advised the County to contact the NRCS. Wilson said the current person, Jeff Loof at NRCS told him it was "news to him," and it was "not his job." Mockler said Kent Woodmansey advised him that the NRCS is responsible for the small operations if it is requested. Mockler said he went through the process personally on his farm. Petrik pointed out if the County didn't have regulations more restrictive than the state, then it would be regulated by the DENR. Aden said getting a letter from the DENR is a way to get someone objective involved in the process. Manning pointed out a paragraph regarding conditional use permits that requires state approval for a CAFO. Craig Nelson said he has dealt with NRCS, and in his experience if they do not have an answer, they will go to someone who does have an answer; they will not drop the ball. Hammond said the NRCS does have resources to determine the difference between a CAFO and an AFO; he makes the phone call, and the right person shows up.

Heisinger said farmers need to realize the people against the ordinance do not want to take their farms away. They are trying to protect the farmers' property values, too, by limiting expansion. D. Lyso said

the regulations say expansion can be allowed, not that it will be allowed; there are gray areas. Aden clarified that it refers to existing operations and said it would be the kind of thing that affects the Heine farm. Petrik said it is almost prejudicial that farmers have 15 pages regulating their livestock operations, when anyone in Clay County can present risks. He stated the bar has been set higher for livestock producers, and that is fine because they are in the business of producing safe, healthy food, but others have not had the same scrutiny. Sandy Pederson asked why raise the upper limit if no one is close to the limit.

S. Pederson asked whether it is true that a 4-H kid could not have one animal under the current regulations. Aden said it is true and has been fixed in the proposed regulations. S. Peterson asked about the difference between Small A and Small B and asked who decides who might pollute. Aden said the County would refer to the DENR, and the determination is site-specific. Petrik said the proposal allows the County to go above and beyond and gives the County the freedom to be overprotective. Aden said the County has tried to build the regulations in such a way that there can be protections and still allow producers to have their operations. Skyrm asked for clarification on Small A & B as to which is AFO/CAFO. Aden said Small B is AFO and Small B is CAFO due to the site's potential for pollution hazards.

Skyrm said this county is different from others because there is a lot of water, and because Clay County does have a lot of water she thinks it is not a good idea to make setbacks smaller.

S. Pederson said there are a lot of rural residences, and it makes sense tax-wise to allow people to build in rural areas. Aden said it was pointed out by someone else earlier that people who are building in the country have to expect farming.

Kirkeby asked why the definition of agriculture was changed to include CAFOs. Aden said it is permitted in the agriculture section of the regulations, so the definition was changed accordingly. Mockler clarified that the definition was changed back to the 2005 regulations for the current proposal. Aden said it is a difference in a person's perception between small farms and industrial farms; farming has changed since the 50's and 60's. She said the regulations have to speak to current events, to what farming is like today. Petrik said an acreage in Sioux County will cost twice what it does here due to land values.

John Davidson said the effect of setbacks on residential Real Estate property values should be considered. He said he has presented documents published by the Real Estate appraisal industry regarding property values. He said wants Commissioners who live in town to guarantee him that the setbacks would be ok with them if it were near their properties and will take into account the information he has given. Heine responded that Clay County has some of the lowest land values in the area, and that farm land is a couple thousand dollars lower per acre than surrounding counties. Heine said people in the agriculture industry do not want to be in Clay County because of the regulations here.

Heisinger said Clay County is unique because it is bisected by the river and has the bluffs with views that encourage people to build homes in the country. He is worried that the Commissioners do not consider the County's investments by making it a great place for quality of life with the beautiful views. He said the County should encourage people to move to the country.

Powell asked Heisinger if he was involved in drafting the Comprehensive Plan, and it says the County will discourage construction in the rural areas. Powell said in the plan rural areas are set aside for agriculture and not for septic tanks that leach into the Vermillion River. Aden said that almost all of the bluff land is in the NRC district and already has more protections along those vistas.

Manning moved, seconded by Packard and carried to set September 26, 2017 at 10:00 a.m. as the date and time for the Second Reading of Ordinance #2017-01, an amendment to the 2013 Revised Zoning Ordinance for Clay County. Specifically, the Board of County Commissioners will be considering adoption of amendments to Section 2.02, Definitions; Section 3.07, Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO); Section 4.05.01, NRC: Natural Resource Conservation District; Section 4.05.02, A-1: Agricultural District; and 4.0508, APO: Aquifer Protection Overlay District, which were recommended by the Clay County Planning Commission.

At 11:45 a.m., Powell moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to enter an Executive Session for legal and contractual matters per SDCL 1-25-2.

At 12:40 p.m., Manning moved, seconded by Packard and carried to exit the Executive Session.

At 12:41 p.m. Powell moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to adjourn and reconvene Tuesday, September 5, 2017 at 9:00 a.m.

WHEREAS, on June 6, 2017 the Clay County Commission did approve the boundaries of Tax Increment District number one; and

WHEREAS, on September 25, 2017, the Clay County Planning and Zoning Commission did adopt for recommendation a motion modifying the boundaries of Tax Increment District to be reduced from Heikes Tract 2 to the southern 623' east to west by 230' feet north to south; and

WHEREAS, the Clay County Commission finds that;

- (1) Not less than twenty-five percent (25%), by area, of the real property within the district is a blighted area as defined in SDCL 11-9-9 through 11-9-11 or not less than fifty percent (50%), by area, of the real property within the district will stimulate and develop the general economic welfare and prosperity of the state through the promotion and advancement of industrial, commercial, manufacturing, agricultural, or natural resources; and
- (2) The improvement of the area is likely to significantly enhance the value on all of the other real property in the district; and

WHEREAS, the Clay County Commission finds that the aggregate assessed value of the taxable property in this district plus all other existing districts does not exceed ten percent (10%) of the total assessed value of the taxable property within Clay County, South Dakota.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Commission of Clay County, that Tax Incremental District Number One (TIF1) is hereby created in Clay County, and that such District boundary shall be reduced from Heikes Tract 2 to the southern 623' east to west by 230' feet north to south.

At 10:00 a.m., a second reading was held for Ordinance #2017-01, an amendment to the 2013 Revised Zoning Ordinance for Clay County. Specifically, the Board of County Commissioners will be considering adoption of amendments to Section 2.02, Definitions; Section 3.07, Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO); Section 4.05.01, NRC: Natural Resource Conservation District; Section 4.05.02, A-1: Agricultural District; and 4.0508, APO: Aquifer Protection Overlay District, which were recommended by the Clay County Planning Commission.

Mockler announced that the opponents would have 15 minutes for questions and comments, and the proponents would have 15 minutes for questions and comments, with a 2-minute limit per person.

Grace Freeman referred to an e-mail she sent to the individual commissioners. She discussed animal number confinement limits and said as a tourist she avoids places with animal confinements. Freeman

discussed the area where she lives and said it is a scenic route to the Sturgis rally, and she would not like to see confinements in her area.

Barbara Yelverton discussed setbacks, water quality, and economy of scale, and she said she is opposed to setbacks closer to water.

Susanne Skyrm said she is opposed to smaller setbacks near waterways. She asked why the county needs this ordinance if it is not being overrun now with requests for CAFOs.

Caitlin Collier said she has nostalgia for Vermillion in 1976, and she realizes how miserable it is to lose the way things were. She said sometimes people make stupid mistakes and sometimes they cannot get things back. She said the average age of farmers is older now. People cannot recreate something that does not exist any longer and cannot change carbon monoxide levels in the atmosphere, but people can adapt and change. Collier asked the Commissioners if the changes are nostalgic, or if they are looking to try to mitigate changes and hold on to quality of life.

Charles Yelverton said permits, setbacks, and animal numbers are the three big areas of concern. Yelverton spoke about public health and allowing hazards in the environment. He discussed manure and nitrogen levels and said at 4,000 animals the waste is equal to 10 new Vermillions. Yelverton said the Zoning Administrator does not have the budget to allow someone to be employed to monitor manure in the county, and said the DENR (SD Dept. of Environment and Natural Resources) has nine people, not enough staff to monitor 20 new Vermillions. He discussed heavy metals, antibiotics, bacteria, nitrogen, phosphorous, dust, and mold in relation to dairy operations. Yelverton said he does not want to be like Sioux County, IA because Iowa is 49th in water quality in the country and had 818 waterways last year unfit for human consumption. He also cited a survey of Dordt College students who said they noticed a smell when visiting to the college the first time.

Jerry Wilson said he grew up on a small dairy farm and remembers his dad saying they needed to get bigger or get out, so he bought 10 more cows to get to a total of 35. He said the average family farm is 200 cows, and industrial farms put family farms out of business. Wilson said 3 years were spent on the process, and he wonders what could have been accomplished if the Board had been talking about clean industry, such as wind and solar, instead of industrial farms.

Cindy Struckman-Johnson said she has been doing research on social interactions for 35 years. She said attending the meeting was hard because she feels the Commission is not open to the opposition. She said she feels Mockler is a bully and intimidated the speakers, and the other four Commissioners are just enablers.

Jim Petrik spoke as a proponent. He said he wishes the world could go back to 1976 because he could actually get hog feed in Clay County at that time, and there were more livestock in the county back then than there are today, which is unfortunate. Petrik said the best thing for water quality is to have big enough operations to be permitted by the DENR because they are held to a higher standard. He said the large petroleum storage in Vermillion is not built as well as his facilities. Petrik talked about a new dairy in Sioux County that was a \$30 million investment; a donation of \$30,000 was made to Sioux County church groups to get enough kids to help move silage for it. He said the opposition is not comparing apples to apples. Petrik said the best fertilizer is the natural nitrates, phosphorous, etc in manure, and no

human use antibiotics are available for animals as of the 1st of the year. He said it is not an incentive for farmers to misuse antibiotics. Petrik said the bar has been set higher for livestock producers, and that is fine, but he lays awake at night worrying he may become the last livestock producer in Clay County.

Reed Jensen introduced himself as a grain farmer. He said the more local demand the better because it keeps more money in Clay County and creates a better tax base. Jensen referred to Wilson's comments and said there are no dairies left in Clay County to be put out of business. He said the operations are clean, and the hogs are good. He said people are opposed to corporate farms, but no one had a problem with Sanford building a corporate hospital in Vermillion.

Craig Johnson said CAFOs are food sources for the local places such as Hy-Vee, Wal-Mart, Café Brulé, etc., and food prices will go up higher with caps on food production. He said quality of life is a broad spectrum; it might mean putting 3 meals on the table for some people. Johnson talked about the Vermillion Food Pantry and said more people will be coming to the food pantry over the next several years if the County restricts farms. Johnson said he didn't want to see power lines built to Vermillion, but it was for the benefit of the people in Clay County. He said people have to look at the big picture, the benefit of food production for local people, and the Commissioners need to send a message that they are feeding Clay County, Yankton County, and South Dakota.

Petrik added he was at a farm credit meeting a month ago, and regarding a federal reserve newsletter, 12-15% of farm operating loans are in tough shape. He said down the road there will be farmers needing to diversify if grain production does not improve. Petrik said he would hate to see Clay County farmers not have the opportunity.

The meeting was closed to public comments and turned over to the individual Commissioners.

Packard said she feels the board has listened to all sides, and she knows there are different sides. She said she also feels the Commissioners have tried very hard to put in qualifications within applications for Conditional Use Permits that additional site-specific setbacks can be set. She said she did not like the reduction of setbacks, but the County does need an ordinance that works, and she does feel they have a document that allows the County to move forward and work with farmers, agriculture, and the public and that still allows to expansion for Clay County. Packard said she feels it is time to start seeing how it works rather than constantly putting off the decision. With that, she trusts that they will be looking at each application and working closely with DENR, and she would like to look carefully at funding for an additional person in the Zoning Office. She also noted that right now there are no large facilities.

Powell said the Planning & Zoning Commission spent a lot of time on the proposed regulations, and he was not comfortable with 5,600 cows. He said he was listening to the people, and there were items not quite right, so he voted against it last time because he is trying to do the best for everyone. He said those items have been changed. The number was lowered to 4,000 with the ability to grow to 5,000. He said there is nothing like that in Clay County, but at some point in time there might be a need.

Manning stated there are parts he did not agree with the rest on, but overall things are moving in the right direction. He said there have been changes to the proposed regulations to make it better for the Zoning Administrator to monitor things. Manning also said there is a shortage food in Clay County, and he has seen it in his experience on the Vermillion Food Pantry's Board of Directors.

Hammond said he has been responsible for extending the process quite a bit; he has chimed in when he felt it was necessary to make additional changes. He said it has improved because of that. Hammond said he has been on a large number of animal feeding operations of all sizes and has sometimes helped producers put together environmental assessments for some operations like the opposition may fear. He said the process has come a long way, that the planning process is continuous, and he feels this is part of a work in progress. He would not be surprised if the Board took a break and then picked up another part of the zoning ordinance for revision. He feels it should be a continuous work in progress, and although he is not incredibly happy with all aspects, he thinks it is the best that the Commissioners can come up with at this point. Hammond acknowledged the Commissioners could find it needs more tweaking in a short time, but the nice part is it can be a work in progress.

Powell moved to adopt Ordinance #2017-01, an amendment to the 2013 Revised Zoning Ordinance for Clay County. Manning seconded the motion. Roll call vote: Hammond <u>Aye</u>, Manning <u>Aye</u>, Powell <u>Aye</u>, Packard Aye, Mockler Aye. Motion passed.

Powell moved, seconded by Manning and carried to authorize the Chairman to sign the Registration Form for the 2020 Census Local Update of Census Addresses Operation (LUCA).

The Board discussed the 2018 Provisional Budget. The following changes were made to the 2018 Provisional Budget as it was published in the legal newspapers. Reduce Elections budget to \$54,484, raise LEPC to \$2,950, change Senior Citizens budget to \$27,447 (The Main Street Center was allocated \$20,000), change Museums/Historical Society to \$20,000 (Vermillion Area Arts Council was allocated \$5,000), raise the Ambulance budget to \$171,000, and adjust the Transfers Out to \$1,273,517 to account for an adjustment to funding for the Road & Bridge Fund. These adjustments change the General Fund Cash Balance Applied to \$705,815 and the Net Means of Finance and Total Appropriations to \$5,817,867, and reduce the Road & Bridge Fund Cash Balance Applied to \$990,415. Powell moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to adopt the Provisional Budget as the 2018 Annual Budget with the changes as noted.

Packard moved, seconded by Manning to approve the 2018 payroll.

At 11:13 a.m., Manning moved, seconded by Packard and carried to enter an Executive Session for legal matters per SDCL 1-25-2.

At 12:07 p.m., Manning moved, seconded by Hammond and carried to exit the Executive Session.

Packard moved, seconded by Manning and carried to authorize the Chairman's signature on a letter to be sent to Executive Technologies regarding the telephone system contract.

The Board discussed scanning of documents with Alexis Tracy, State's Attorney, and Carri Crum, Auditor.

Manning moved, seconded by Powell and carried to approve the 1-day malt beverage license for Westlund/Peterson Post #44 on November 13, 2017.

Sam Heikes met with the Board to discuss his bee population. He discussed an award he received in 2014 for establishing a pollinator habitat and referenced the benefits of honey bees on crop yields. Heikes said when the beekeeper he works with came to load the bees, he found that he lost 40% of the bees this year. He said he heard the aerial sprayer that allegedly affected the Prairie Sun Organics farm and saw it less than a mile away, and although he cannot say for certain it was the cause of the drop in his bee population, bees are a bell-ringer for environmental quality. Heikes requested a resolution from the Board supporting the health of people in the joint-jurisdiction area. Mockler discussed the sensitive site registration process with Heikes and Glen Pulse of Prairie Sun Organics.

Pulse also discussed his farm with the Board. He said he has learned that state testing levels mirrored the testing he had done privately, and the levels were so high in his grass that his organic certifier has required him to send soybean samples from his field. State's Attorney Tracy asked if the Pulses are seeking civil damages. She said it sounds as if the Commission has no control over the items he is speaking of, that it sounds to her like those are civil damage items. Pulse said he has discovered that SDCL 39-1-17, a pesticide preemption law, prevents local legislation. He said he was originally going to ask for an ordinance to be passed, but since the County cannot do that due to the legislation he is asking the Commission to pass a resolution in support of changes at the state level. Pulse said he is meeting with the Deputy Secretary of the Dept. of Agriculture and an agricultural inspector of pesticides on November 21st and would like to be able to take the resolution with him.

Hammond asked which lab the State used for his testing. Pulse said it was the SD State University lab and the parts per billion were significant for a drift incident.

Pulse thanked the Board for its time and consideration and said if something does not change, he will be out of business. He said he is in a 3-year transition phase where he has to maintain organic practices but cannot have an organic certification, and he cannot guarantee an aerial spraying incident will not happen again next year.

Mockler asked if Pulse maintains setbacks on his land, and Pulse said he has a 30-foot buffer strip that is required nationally. Mockler said he read that the federal guidelines have a 200-foot buffer, and Pulse said if he had buffers that large he would not have any land left.

Tracy discussed draft language of a resolution, and the Board said they would likely need more time than the 21st of November. Tracy advised that the Board would need to carefully weigh property rights and takings issues before passing any resolution. Hammond and Manning discussed with Pulse aerial spraying vs. ground application. Hammond also discussed the current zoning ordinance with Tracy.
